

Professor Friedrich Lösel is Director of the Institute of Criminology at the University of Cambridge and on leave as Professor of Psychology at the University of Erlangen-Nuremberg (since 2005). Before that he was Professor at Bielefeld University and worked in two Advanced Research Centres of the German Research Council. His research addressed juvenile delinquency, offender treatment, prisons and alternatives, school bullying, psychopathy, football hooliganism, forensic assessment, resilience, developmental prevention and programme evaluation. Currently, he is conducting a longitudinal and prevention study of 700 children and their families. He is a Past-President of the European Association of Psychology and Law and of the Criminological Society of the German-speaking countries and a Fellow of the Academy of Experimental Criminology. In recognition of his research he received the European Award in Psychology and Law, the German Psychology Prize, an honorary Dr. sc. from Glasgow Caledonian University and the Sellin-Glueck Award of the American Society of Criminology.

He was one of the winners of The Stockholm Prize in Criminology in 2006 and was appointed to the Jury in late 2007.
